The school implemented College Fridays with the assistance of the AVID Coordinator who set up these presentations via Zoom through the Advisory classes on Fridays. The presentations provided information on college life, scholarships, virtual college tours, and special guests.

IGP progress was monitored to ensure 100% completion. Inviting parents and meeting with every student to review their IGP individually was effective. Funds should be allocated to conduct after school or Saturdays to accommodate working parents.

By June 2023, the percentage of students passing all of their classes in 7th grade will increase from 73. 5% to 78.5 %, an increase of 5%, as measured by the final report card grades.

Although the goal was not met, progress was made and the percentage did increase by 3.5%. Hiring and maintaining two counselors for the entire year would help students to achieve at higher rates. Our school intends to hold a meeting with the students after every report card, helping them to create and work toward SMART goals, and meeting with students and their parents when students are not making progress toward their SMART goals to develop a plan for student success.

By June 2023, The percentage of students in 8th grade who are on-track for culmination will increase by 10% from 76.5% to 86.5% as measured by the final report grades.

Informing students and parents of the culmination requirements throughout the school year and working with students who are not on-track for culmination helped to meet and to exceed the goal for students on track for culmination. 91% of 8th graders were on-track for culmination. Funds should be allocated to conduct after school or Saturdays to accommodate working parents.

Although teachers are integrating both the Reading and Writing strands, the tasks are not consistently grounded in evidence that aligns with the demands of the standards. Professional development will be given to help teachers understand the meaning and expectations of the standards and how to address the tasks of the standards in cohesion with the new curriculum. Professional development will also include modeling research-based effective strategies (marking and annotating text, close reading, and claim-evidence-reasoning [CER]) teachers can implement to support students in gaining the skills required by the standards. The Listening & Speaking strands are integrated with minimal consistency. Professional development will be presented on AVID academic discourse strategies and how to impede them in the daily curriculum. Administrators will revise their informal observation protocol to include actionable feedback on the implementation of these strands.

By June 2023, at least 50% of ELA tasks will incorporate DOK level 3/4 tasks, as measured by daily administrator observation data, followed by actionable feedback.



Although the required workshops were conducted, parent attendance was low; thereby not achieving the goal of having an average of 30 participants. Phone calls were made to parents to invite them to the meetings. This year, we will personalize notices/announcements regarding workshops on IRP and reclassification criteria.

Describe how the strategies used contributed to the school's success.

Keeping track of students scoring Basic and above allowed the team to focus on students who would benefit from intervention programs on the Reading Growth Measure Test which was used for the first time last year. Due to the new test used to test students' basic skills in reading, the team spent time working on lessons that would empower students to use different reading strategies to increase reading fluency and comprehension.

By June 2023, the percent of our English Learners who met the reclassification criteria will go from 4.7% to 15%, an increase of 10.3% as measured by Focus EL Dashboard.

The reclassification team collected and analyzed data to find good candidates to reclassify under Bulletin 6890.4. The team set up meetings to amend IEPs to submit reclassification candidates to MMED for students who were good candidates for the process. The team also reached out to all the parents of the reclassification candidates to explain the process.

The designated ELD team engaged in a PLC cycle of inquiry where they learned how to progress monitor, analyze student data for instructional implications, plan for differentiated instruction, and apply research-based strategies modeled by MMALC to advance student outcomes.

What implications do these results have for next year's SPSA Plan?

The school will continue to provide high-leverage PD on the strategies that proved successful in helping students reach reclassification. MMALC will continue to support teachers through PDSA cycles to encourage teachers to implement research-based language development strategies in their daily instruction. Teachers will be trained on the intervention curriculum to ensure they target the criteria needed for students to reach Reclassification status.

The school will continue to deliver parent workshops for EL parents, on the topic of reclassification to inform them of the four criteria needed to meet reclassification status. The school will also continue to work with the SpEd department to inform SpED parents about the process of reclassification as per Bulletin 6890.4. The reclassification team will continue to analyze data and submit the paperwork for candidate to MMED.

The personnel was also available during school events taking place after their work-day assignment.
